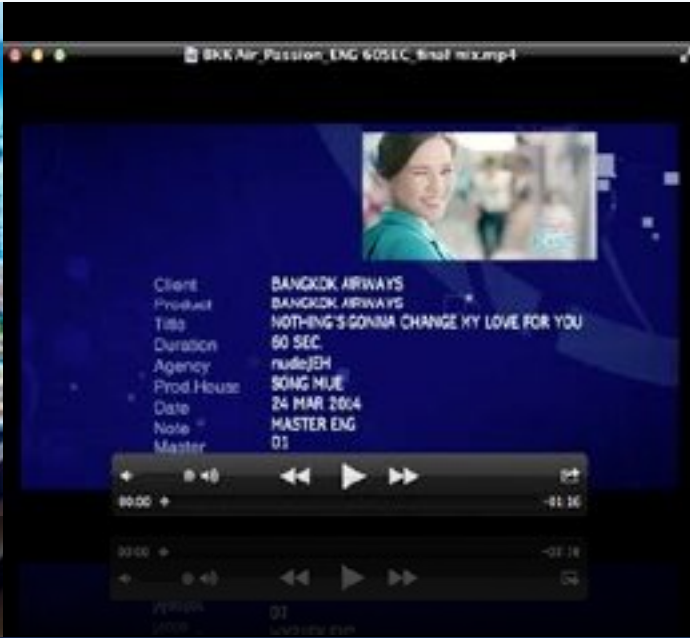

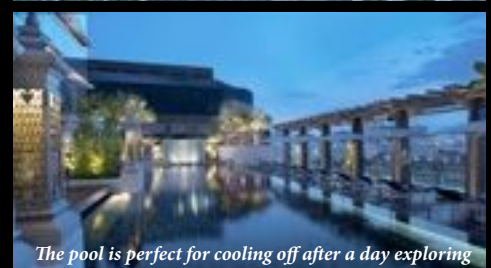

**M**odern meets old, fun sits alongside serenity and chaos lives with calm. Bangkok is truly a city of extremes and one that never fails to delight.

It is the archetypal modern Asian urban experience, with sophisticated eateries, five-star hotels and skyscrapers laden with modern technology. But it is also true to its past and street hawkers provide incredible food in the stifling, but somehow perfect heat.

Ancient temples and ruins nestle in comfortably with the modern structures, and the high end designer malls as much of an attraction as the traditional floating markets.

**WAT ARUN** is Bangkok's most famous ancient landmark and is usually first on visitors' to-do lists. This Buddhist temple was built in the seventeenth century, although the spires were added in the nineteenth. There is a small charge for foreigners who wish to visit it.

### TRAVEL DETAILS

Bangkok has two airports, Suvarnabhumi Airport and Don Muang Airport and the first is used by all airlines in the country aside from Nok Air, Orient Thai and Air Asia, which all use the latter.

There is nearly a 20 mile journey into central Bangkok from both airports and a great deal of congestion on the road so allow time for this when booking. Use the Airport Rail Link to get into the city as it takes 15 minutes. The city boasts all the major transportation options you would expect to other parts of the country as well as the Skytrain, which was built in a bid to ease congestion.

### TOP TIP!

Book a tour of the city as you will get so much out of the experience. They are inexpensive and will give an insight you would be hard to get by trusting to luck.

A short journey out of the city and you will find what's dubbed the largest outdoor museum in the world, **ANCIENT SIAM**. It contains replicas of many of Thailand's most important structures including the Sanphet Prasat Palace. The park is even shaped to replicate Thailand and the structures are placed geographically.

Back in the city, when exploring the streets you will be tempted by all sorts of street food from various hawkers. Standards vary but we say try as much

as you can and the more exotic the better (don't blame us though if it goes wrong!)

And when it comes to shopping you need to visit the floating markets of Taling Chan Market, Bang Ku Wiang Market, Tha Kha and Damnoen Saduak.

And on dry land **CHATUCHAK WEEKEND MARKET**, once the preserve of wholesalers, is now an institution for individuals looking for a bargain.

The World Meteorological Organisation has Bangkok as the world's hottest city. The average air temperature throughout the year is 28 degrees centigrade but this hits 34 degrees between the months of March and May along with 90% humidity!

The central plains are resplendent with agriculture and this rural food bowl, or 'great rice bowl' as it's sometimes referred to, has long been the envy of neighbouring nations.

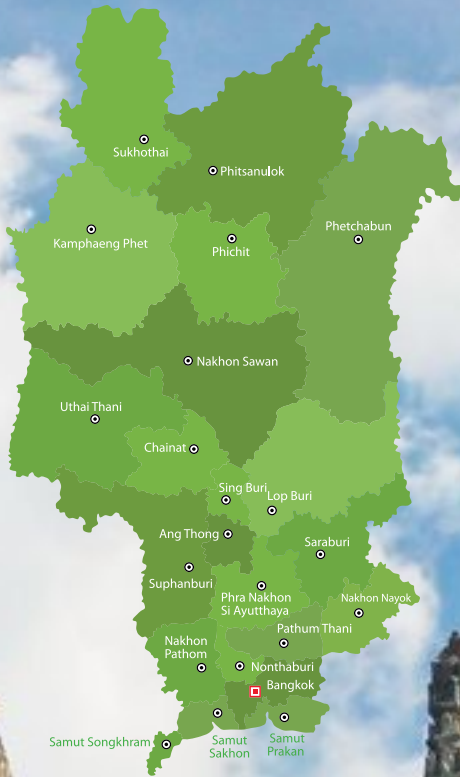
This is Thailand relatively untouched by the modern world and the seemingly

endless rice fields are something to behold.

Having said that, visits to the heart of the country are more about the discovery of its past rather than spectacular scenery.

About 30 minutes outside of the capital is **NAKHON PATHOM**, which boasts Thailand's tallest Buddhist monument, the 380 foot high Phra Pathom Chedi. It marks the location of where Buddhism was introduced to the region more than

The Central Plains are well connected with the rest of Thailand through the roads, but the most spectacular way to travel up is by boat. Alternatively it is possible to travel by rail.

TOP TIP!



Visit Nakhon Sawan, which is not yet a relatively well known tourist destination. But there is plenty to see and do including a large aquarium a space observatory centre and the largest swamp in the country.

2000 years ago. The ruins of **AYUTTHAYA** are spellbinding and there is plenty of fun to be had further north in **LOP BURI** where ruins meet cheeky monkeys for a great day out. For those who want to take the infamous trip over the River Kwai should head to **KANCHANABURI** in the west of the region, which is the base for the experience. It also has museums dedicated to remembering the plight

of those who died building the railways during the Second World War when Japan was in control of the area. **PHITSANULOK** is one of the oldest cities in Thailand and due to its position sat on the cross roads of the north and central regions plays an important commercial role. While most of the old city was destroyed in a devastating fire in 1955, the city is known for its house boats that sit on the River Nan and the stunning Wat Phra Sri Rattana Mahathat.

# The North



A region that seems a lifetime away from the adrenaline fuelled beaches in the south, northern Thailand boasts hills, temples, staggering views and a truly unique culture.

The larger part of the north is a national park, which means there is an abundance of wildlife including tigers, birds and elephants.

This makes it ideal for trekking and experiencing contact with some of the

hill tribes who are scattered across the terrain.

But there is more to the region than endless jungle as it includes among its cities, Thailand's second largest hub and former capital, **CHIANG MAI**.

An incredible city resplendent with temples and architecture contained in the old city walls, it is the perfect base for exploring the rest of the region.

For those who prefer a more relaxed atmosphere, **CHIANG RAI** is a great

**TRAVEL DETAILS**

Flights to Chiang Mai from Bangkok take just under an hour and a half and Thai International flies daily. By road, the journey is far longer, often taking longer than 12 hours. Night coaches are popular for those wanting to try and sleep and save some money.

**TOP TIP!**

It is best to visit the north between November and April due to the weather conditions, but it does get cooler at night, so pack suitable cold weather clothing, especially if hiking. Those looking for a deal on accommodation should travel in the wet season, June to September, as options are plentiful and temperatures remain warm.

alternative. Ideally located for elephant treks and hiking tours, there are markets selling goods crafted by the tribes in the surrounding area.

**THE NORTHERN PLAINS**, while flatter than the far north, still boasts numerous hills and forests and holds the city of **SUKHOTHAI**.

This 13th century delight is a **UNESCO** World Heritage Site, offering an insight into the kingdom's rich history, with ruins of palaces and city walls.

There are five zones to the old city and each charges a separate entry fee.

The modern part of the city provides entertainment though as well as numerous restaurants and bars.

For those looking for an experience that only became available 40 years ago, **MAE HON SON** is a worthwhile visit.

Formerly considered a frontier town with Burma, it was isolated from the outside world until the 1970s, but is now firmly on the map thanks to new roads.

It allows for incredible views, often complemented by morning mists. And rather than images of Wild West ramshackle properties, five-star hotels have moved into the area.

White water rafting enthusiasts and those with a taste for adventure should head to PAI, 100km west of Mae Hong Son. Named after its river, the town has tour companies that offer the chance to tackle the longest river in the region. Some even have the option to return by elephant!

# The East



The pristine beaches of the east coast and short mountain ranges have long attracted travellers from across the globe.

**PATTAYA**, Thailand's first international resort, is attempting to rebuild its image as a hedonistic destination for singles to a more family-orientated resorts.

That's not to say there aren't still an abundance of bars and clubs for night-time enthusiasts.

Accommodation options are plentiful and there is so much to see and do, it's a great base for those who want it all on their doorstep.

Water sports, restaurants and market shopping are just a few of the must dos in Pattaya.

There are also plenty of small islands to discover which can be reached by chartered boats.

If you want to get back to nature, **KO SAMET ISLAND** ticks all the boxes and

is part of a national marine park.

While it is not unspoiled and development has taken place, it offers a real chance to escape with beaches and plenty of camping. Due to its proximity to Bangkok it does get busy at weekends, but there is plenty of wonderful scenery and lush rainforests spilling onto white beaches and crystal waters to keep you happy.

A visit to **CHANTHABURI** region and its evergreen forest is a great place to discover beautiful waterfalls and is a

### TRAVEL DETAILS

There are two domestic airports on the east coast, one near Trat and one at U-Tapao naval base. For road options Highway 3 stretches across the coast, beginning at Bangkok and there are routes to avoid heading back into the capital if you wish to head north. There is also a rail service from Bangkok to Si Racha and Pattaya.

popular place to explore by hiking. It's also a welcome alternative to the resort destinations in the east.

Close to the Cambodian border is the **KO CHANG** archipelago, which attracts tourists with its waterfalls, beaches, mangrove forests and reefs. It is quickly becoming more advanced in its tourist offering and the rainforest is home to an impressive range of wildlife, some of which is only found on the island. Be sure to explore the neighbouring islands as well as there are some hidden gems

to discover.

**SI RACHA** is worth visiting for its seafood and just follow the locals to find the best spots to eat.

To get to the islands you will need to go through **TRAT PROVINCE**, which boasts a breath-taking woodland landscape. The region thrives on its rubber and chili plantations as well as fishing.

The capital of the same name is used as a departure point for visits to the islands or Cambodia.

# The North East

The North East region is known as **ISAN** and accounts for around a third of Thailand. This incredibly rural, but densely populated area is complete with ancient fossils, nature parks and Khmer temples.

Due to the traditional nature of the region, some of the country's older customs can be seen here that aren't practiced in the rest of the country.

Candle processions and festivals are just some of the vibrant and beautiful moments to capture while travelling in Isan.

And that is what the region is about, sightseeing, buying local craft and the chance to immerse yourself in a more traditional aspect of Thai culture.

A real highlight is **KHAO YAI NATIONAL PARK** where you can camp and look out for its abundance of wildlife. This can either be undertaken on foot or by bike, but expect crowds at weekends as it is popular with tourists and locals alike.

For an incredible glimpse into the past, head to **BAN CHIANG HISTORICAL SITE** where the small village of Ban Chiang was discovered. It turned out to be part of a civilization predating China and is an important part of Asian prehistory.

And an insight in the Khymer Empire can be seen at **PRASAD HIN PHANOM RUNG**, which was built in the eleventh century.

**KHON KAEN** is the political centre of the region and is very much part of developing Thailand. Commerce is in abundance and it is a good example of modern Thailand sat alongside the traditional way of life. There is also a unique spicy culinary aspect to the city, **KORAT** or Nakorn Rachisima to give it its official name, is ideally situated to explore the many ruins and temples of the area.

There is plenty to explore including ancient rock paintings and one of Thailand's earliest images of the reclining Buddha.

It would be a shame to not experience the **MEKONG RIVER** and cruises are available of all lengths from a couple of hours.

**BAN CHIANG NATIONAL MUSEUM** is another one of Thailand's many UNESCO World Heritage sites and displays ancient tools and artefacts from the Bronze Age.

Sat on the banks of the Mekong River is **NONG KHAI** a centre of activity and commerce. Despite this its French history is still prevalent and the attitude is very much laid back. Once again craftware is available as well as the chance to explore outside of the town into the forests or along the river.

To understand the role of elephants in the building of Khymer temples, venture to **SURIN**, where the Elephant Roundup festival reveals all about this fascinating relationship between man and beast.

It includes demonstrations of how elephants are trained, a football match and other performances.

Nakhon Ratchasima, Korat, Khon Kaen, Udon Thani and Ubon Ratchathani all have flights operated by Thai Airways Domestic. It is also convenient to travel by road as the region boasts four highways and there are plenty of air-conditioned buses that link to other regions in Thailand. There are also express trains that leave daily from Bangkok to various cities and towns in Isan.

### TOP TIP!



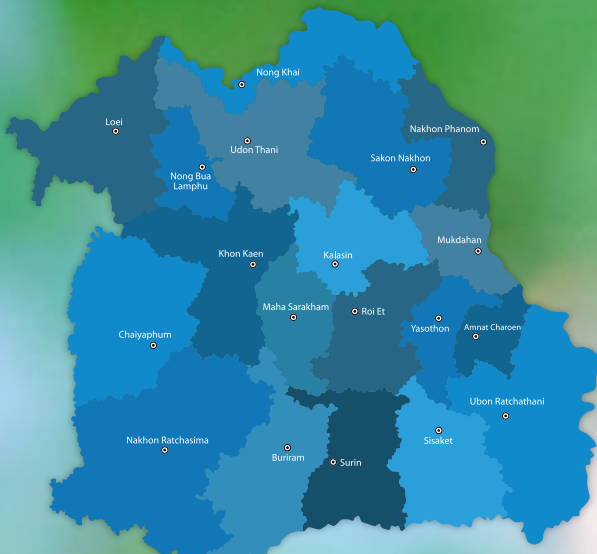
Look out for Matmee silk and wickerwork items that are unique to the region that make a perfect gift or memento.

# The South - Gulf

Samui Airport has flights to Phuket and other mainland destinations. There is also an airport in Surat Thani. There are several regular ferry services to Samui as well. Ko Tao has no airport and you will have to arrive by boat. This will depend on where you are travelling from.

## TOP TIP!

Learn to dive on Ko Tao where the waters are ideal for beginners and the island is geared towards the activity.

Due to their distance from the capital, they are far less built up, but also offer less in terms of activities.

Nature and geological lovers should make time to visit **KHAO SAM ROI YOT NATIONAL PARK**.

It boasts incredible limestone formations and caves as well as marshes that are a haven for migratory birds. With nearly 100 square kilometres, there are also beaches and forests to explore.

The island of **KO SAMUI** is now Thailand's second largest resort business, knocking Phuket into third. Developers have flooded in to cater to

the demand for the incredible beauty it possesses. This is the archetypal white sandy coconut lined beaches slipping into crystal waters.

**KO TAO** is where to head if you want to grab a slice of underdeveloped heaven. There are still rustic huts to stay in if that is your style. The realm of the diver, its perfect for the beginner and offers plenty for the experienced underwater enthusiast. On land there is plenty of jungle exploration and partying through the night.

Half way between Ko Samui and Ko Tao, geographically and in terms of

offering is **KO PHA NGAN**, home of the notorious full moon party.

It is an island that still offers the delights of a seemingly undiscovered jungle and relaxed beautiful beaches, but higher end offerings are creeping in, offering the best of the backpacker world and that of the more upmarket experience.

Then of course there is the deep south of the Gulf Coast, where there is a unique blend of Thai-Buddhist, Malay-Muslim and Chinese culture.

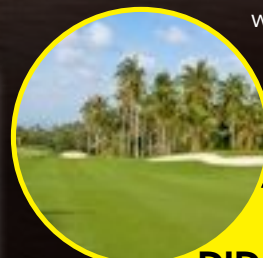

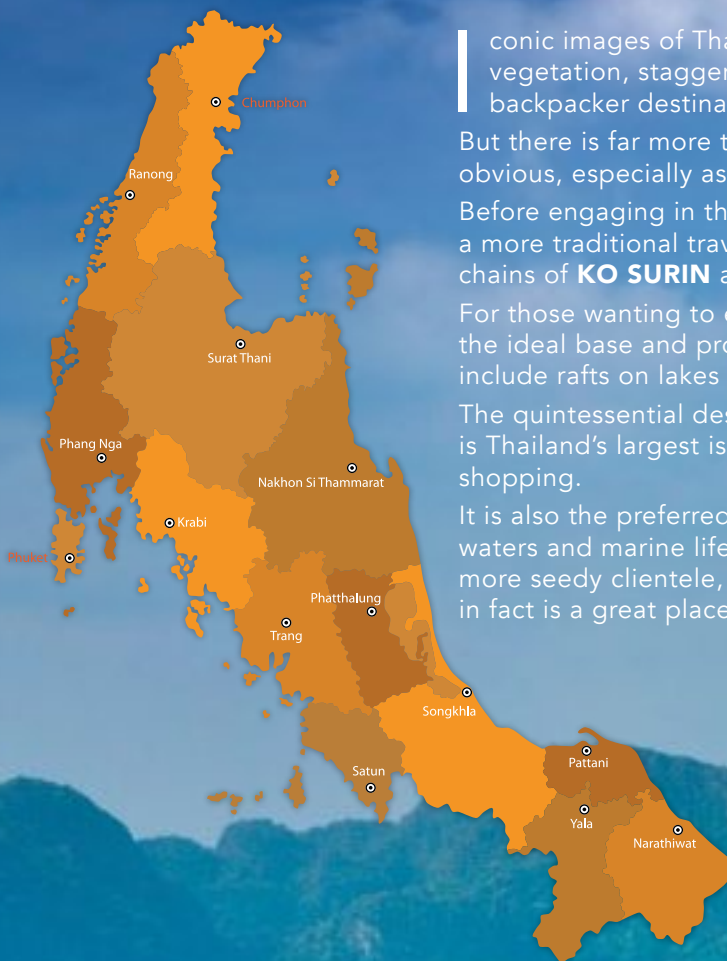

Phuket has an international airport and Bangkok has connecting flights to Ranong and Phuket. There are also the overnight bus connections from the capital as a cheaper alternative. If you prefer the train it is best to head for Surat Thani to get to Phuket as it is not on the main rail line. The best way to explore the region is by boat and these can easily be chartered but be sure to use a reputable company.

## TOP TIP!

### Brave the weather!

From May to October a southwest monsoon hits the Andaman coast bringing with it heavy rain and rough seas. While it stops potential island visits it does provide great discounts on accommodation, ideal for a diving holiday when it doesn't matter if it is raining or not!

# TRAVEL CHECKLIST

## Weather

In general you can expect a typically tropical climate that is hot and humid, but there are three seasons. There's a hot, wet and cool season, although the country offers a diverse range of geography that allows you to pick weather that suits your needs.

## Population

There are 65 million citizens in Thailand of which seven million live in the capital, Bangkok.

## Language

The official language is Thai, but English is spoken throughout much of Thailand.

## Religion

The large majority (94.6%) of Thais are Buddhist, 4.6% of Thais are Muslim 0.7% of Thais are Christian.

## Currency

The Thai Baht is used as coins and notes. Most banks are open weekdays, 9:30 am to 3:30 pm, though certain banks have shorter Saturday hours. In tourist destinations currency booths are often open for longer periods.

## Time

Thailand Standard time is GMT +7 with no daylight savings.

## Electricity

Electrical outlets in Thailand are charged to 220v at 50 cycles per second, which is compatible with appliances from the U.K. but not those from the US and many other nations.

## Accommodation

From budget to luxury, there is accommodation for all in Thailand. Offpeak (May-Aug) is the best time to find a deal, while December to February is the premium time to go and prices reflect this. Thai hospitality is celebrated around the world, so whether staying in a beach hut or a five-star hotel, you will be in for a treat.

## Telephone

Emergency numbers are often three or four digit numbers, including Tourist Police, which is 1155. Cell coverage is widespread and it is cheap to purchase a mobile phone.

## Getting there

As you would expect with one of the most popular destinations in the world, flying to Thailand can be expensive in high season so be sure to book tickets as far in advance as possible. Road access in and out of the country is improving and there is a crossing with China. It is worth finding out requirements and the documentation needed specific to your nationality and where you will be entering Thailand.

## Getting around

Once you are in, Thailand is a relatively inexpensive and generally efficient destination to navigate. Whether it's by bus, car, boat or bicycle each mode of transport has its merits. The country is set up to accommodate tourism, but always research companies and check safety records. Alternatively use a trusted tour company to handle the logistics of your trip.

## Visas

Certain countries have visa exemptions, some nationalities can apply for visa on arrival and others need to apply in advance. For more information on visas [click here](#)
